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ASKing for the Nations CZECH

The most common comment from various **Czech** believers is that many nationals, including believers, rely too much on materialism blinding them to such an extent that they don't really think about the spiritual world. With material things readily provided such as decent education and health care, people just don't think of a life beyond this world. There is not an overt demonstration of evil as in other countries, yet many say they are atheists, agnostics or just areligious. Believers coming from neighboring Slovakia notice a great spiritual deadness as they cross the Czech border.

The largest people group in Czechia is the Slovaks followed by the Ukrainians and the Vietnamese. There are also many Roma who have difficulty interacting with the native Czechs even though they are not foreigners, having lived here for hundreds of years.

The many small churches in Prague do not cooperate with each other and are more likely to grow at the expense of others. In contrast, the churches do cooperate well in Brno, the second largest city.

In 1993, Czechoslovakia separated into Czechia and Slovakia. The Czech Republic has been called "the North Korea of Europe" because of atheism and alcoholism. Yet in the past Czechs have given the church a marvelous legacy. Christians such as John Hus were martyred, his death laying the foundation for the subsequent Protestant Reformation. The Moravian movement with its primary emphasis on prayer and missions expanded all over the world was also birthed here. Unfortunately, the counter reformation drove out the Gospel, which has lasted till this day.

Let's ASK:

- For God's spirit to combat the secularism and materialism in Czech society. *Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit,' says the LORD Almighty.* Zechariah 4:6
- That the Word of God would counteract the apathy and numbness of the people of Czechia. I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will. Romans 12:1-2, Isaiah 55:11
- For ministries like the International House of Prayer in Prague and struggling small churches that have been wounded from the ravages of Communism, which ended in 1989, to become vibrant with the presence of God. Your people will rebuild the ancient ruins and will raise up the ageold foundations; you will be called Repairer of Broken Walls, Restorer of Streets with Dwellings. Isaiah 58:12

Background

The Mongol, Khalka of the Czech Republic migrated from northern Mongolia. They have kept detailed records of their genealogy to prove that they are descendants of Ghengis Khan. The majority of the Khalka live in China and follow Tibetan Buddhism, also known as Lamaism. Their religious ideals have bonded them together making for a kind and hospitable society, but it has also robbed their manhood of energy and natural ambition. They form one of the country's smaller ethnic groups and comprise 3.6% of the foreign workforce (2008). The Czech government is working with the Mongolian government to control illegal migration because of the danger of abuse that foreign workers face. There are very few believers among the Mongol, Khalka in the Czech Republic or in China. The seed that was sown by missionaries in the early 20th century has not yet born much fruit.

Historical evidence suggests that Christianity had arrived in **Britain** by the beginning of the third century AD. Much of Britain's institutions and laws are based on Christianity and the coronation establishes the constitutional importance of Christianity in national life. Britain's empire and influence have waned because of Britain's failure to keep its promise to support a national homeland for the Jews after the 1st World War, and the passing of ungodly laws since the end of the 2nd World War. In spite of this she has continued to send many out as missionaries and Bible translators. In recent years there has been an influx from the nations including missionaries who have come to return the blessing.

The union of England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland is under threat too with divisions brought to the surface and deepened with the vote to leave the European Union after nearly 50 years as a member. The nation's Christian heritage is under constant attack from secular humanism and liberal ideologies as well as a burgeoning Muslim population and influence. Operation World estimates that 60% of the population are Christian, but church attendance was estimated as only 5% in 2015. Many people have very limited knowledge of the basics of the Christian faith.

Let's ASK:

- For revival within the churches, unity among the denominations and a heart to reach out with the gospel. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. John 13:35, Leviticus 20:26, Exodus 15:13
- For protection of the children being exposed to liberal agendas through schools and the media and the strengthening of all those engaged with the evangelism and discipleship of children and young people. Tell to the coming generation, the glorious deeds of the LORD, and his might, and the wonders that he has done. Psalm 78:1-4, Matthew 18:6
- For repentance for abandoning God's laws and despising our Christian heritage. ...Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the Lord our God will call. Acts 2:37-39, Acts 3:19-21
- For protection of the union of the home nations, healing of national divisions and wisdom for future relationship with Europe. In particular for Parliamentarians and the current Government to discover the fear of the Lord and discern His will. The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight. Proverbs 9:10, Psalm 2

GUJARATI UPG

Population:	631,000
Primary Religion:	Hinduism (64.95%)
Language:	Gujarati

Background

The UK has over 200,000 Gujarati speakers, many of them situated in the London area, Birmingham, Manchester and in Leicester, Coventry, Bradford and the former mill towns within Lancashire. Some neighbourhoods may be 80% Gujarati. Many come from India, but a portion of these numbers consists of East African Gujaratis who were expelled from countries such as Uganda. Most, with British passports, settled in the UK. The majority are Hindu but some are Muslim.

Older Gujaratis are not comfortable with the possibility of their language not surviving them, but younger generations have learned English and adapted to the culture. Despite the abundance of Christians and churches in the UK, these groups remain virtually unreached with the Gospel. Only 0.05% are Christian.

ASK ... that the Lord will raise up evangelists with a compassion for these people, and that the Gujarat people will

recognise the uniqueness of Jesus (Acts 17:24-25, 30, 31) and embrace Him as their Lord and Saviour (Acts 4:12).
